## DECISION ON ATTORNEY FEES AND COSTS<sup>1</sup>

## **Vowell**, Chief Special Master:

In this case under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program,<sup>2</sup> I issued a decision on October 1, 2013, awarding compensation based on the parties' joint stipulation. On or about February 17, 2014, petitioner sent an informal final application for attorneys' fees and costs to respondent. In informal discussions, respondent raised objections to certain items in petitioner's application. On March 5, 2014, petitioner filed a stipulation for attorney fees and costs, requesting a total of \$38,380.94 and indicating that respondent does not object to her request.

I find that this petition was brought in good faith and that there existed a reasonable basis for the claim. Therefore, an award for fees and costs is appropriate, pursuant to 42 U.S.C. §§ 300aa-15(b) and (e)(1). Further, the proposed amount seems reasonable and appropriate.

## Accordingly, I hereby award the total \$38,380.94<sup>3</sup> as follows:

- A lump sum of \$37,250.00 in the form of a check payable jointly to petitioner, Christina Michalski, and petitioner's counsel of record, Elizabeth M. Muldowney, for petitioner's attorney fees and costs, and
- A lump sum of \$1,130.94 in the form of a check payable to petitioner,
   Christina Michalski, for her personal litigation costs.

The clerk of the court shall enter judgment in accordance herewith.4
