DECISION AWARDING DAMAGES¹

Roth, Special Master:

On October 19, 2012, Laura May filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-10, *et seq.*² [the “Vaccine Act” or “Program”], alleging that she developed various neurological and physical complications as a result of the Human Papillomavirus (“HPV”) vaccine she received on February 23, 2010. Respondent denies that the flu vaccine is the cause of petitioner’s alleged injuries. Stipulation at ¶¶ 6, 17.

On January 19, 2016, respondent filed a stipulation agreeing to settle this case and describing the settlement terms. According to respondent’s stipulation, petitioner agrees to the proposed award of compensation. Pursuant to the terms stated in the attached stipulation, **petitioner is awarded:**

² The Program comprises Part 2 of the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act of 1986, Pub. L. No. 99-660, 100 Stat. 3755, codified as amended, 42 U.S.C. §§ 300aa-10 *et seq.* (hereinafter “Vaccine Act” or “the Act”). Hereafter, individual section references will be to 42 U.S.C. § 300aa of the Act.

A lump sum of \$50,000.00 in the form of a check payable to petitioner, Laura May. This amount represents compensation for all damages that would be available under 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a).

The special master adopts the parties' stipulation attached hereto, and awards compensation in the amount and on the terms set forth therein. The clerk of the court is directed to enter judgment in accordance with this decision.³
