## **DECISION ON ATTORNEY FEES AND COSTS<sup>1</sup>**

**Vowell**, Special Master:

On October 28, 2014, Amy Fogg ("petitioner") filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq*,<sup>2</sup> [the "Vaccine Act" or "Program"]. The petition alleges that Ms. Fogg suffered a left shoulder injury as a result of the administration of a tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis ("Tdap") vaccination on February 12, 2014. (Petition at p. 1.) On January 12, 2015, I issued a decision awarding compensation to petitioner based on respondent's proffer on award of compensation.

On January 20, 2015, the parties filed a Stipulation of Fact Concerning Attorneys' Fees and Costs. (ECF No. 17.) According to the stipulation, the parties agree upon a

total award of attorneys' fees and costs to petitioner in the amount of \$13,000.00. (*Id.*) In accordance with General Order #9, petitioner's counsel represents that petitioner incurred no out-of-pocket expenses. (*Id.*)

The Vaccine Act permits an award of reasonable attorneys' fees and costs. 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(e). I find the proposed amount to be reasonable.

## Accordingly, I award the total \$13,000.00<sup>3</sup> as a lump sum in the form of a check jointly payable to petitioner and petitioner's counsel Paul Brazil.

The clerk of the court shall enter judgment in accordance herewith.<sup>4</sup>
