ORDER CONCLUDING PROCEEDINGS¹

On August 30, 2018, petitioner filed a petition under the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act, 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-10-34 (2012), alleging that she suffered anaphylaxis and Guillain-Barre Syndrome as a result of her September 21, 2015 influenza ("flu") vaccination. (ECF No. 1.) This case was originally assigned to then Chief Special Master Dorsey on September 4, 2018. (ECF No. 9.) It was later assigned to my docket on November 6, 2019. (ECF No. 26.) On January 20, 2021, petitioner filed a joint stipulation of dismissal on behalf of the parties pursuant to Vaccine Rule 21(a)(1)(B). (ECF No. 51.)²

Accordingly, pursuant to Vaccine Rule 21(a), this case is hereby **dismissed without prejudice**. The Clerk of the Court is hereby instructed that a **judgment shall not enter** in the instant case pursuant to Vaccine Rule 21(a).
